- Working hours – 8.30 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. on all working days and local holidays.
- Library tickets issued to staff, research scholars, P.G. and U.G. students.

The cards are arranged author wise and subject wise in alphabetical order. The books are arranged according to Colon classification. The automated services are classification, accessioning, cataloguing subject-wise, author-wise and title-wise. Boolean search and term search-card catalogues are also available. Card catalogues are available for the users and are computerized. Library staff members are trained to use the computers for updating the catalogue system in the library.

The online database inflibnet can be accessed from the library.

- The e-books and e-journals are available in the library through [www.inflibnet.ac.in](http://www.inflibnet.ac.in). In all, nearly 3000 journals and 75000 e-books are available through this scheme covering all major areas of science, social science and humanities. All the staff and student can access this.
- There are some online journals too, that are accessible from the library.
- The library presently subscribes to more periodicals, including both journals and magazines and 14 daily newspapers.

The latest upgradations and new implementations of library services are listed below:

- CCTV with 15 cameras are installed.
- The entire library collection has been barcoded through Libwater Software.
- The Inflibnet facility has been introduced, through which about 2000 e-journals and 50,000 e-books are accessible.
- The document circulation system has been fully transformed to an automated barcode-based mode from traditional manually-operated inventory-based system.
- The book-bank facility for students of the non-creamy layer of the society has been upgraded.
- The SDI (Selective Dissemination of Information) service has been implemented for faculty members and students.
- The standards of CAS (Current Awareness Service) & CCS (Career Counselling Service) have been upgraded.

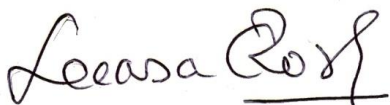
