The cards are arranged author wise and subject wise in alphabetical order. The books are arranged according to Colon classification. The automated services are classification, accessioning, cataloguing subject-wise, author-wise and title-wise. Boolean search and term search-card catalogues are also available. Card catalogues are available for the users and are computerized. Library staff members are trained to use the computers for updating the catalogue system in the library.

The online database inflibnet can be accessed from the library.

- The e-books and e-journals are available in the library through <a href="www.inflibnet.ac.in">www.inflibnet.ac.in</a>.
   In all, nearly 3000 journals and 75000 e-books are available through this scheme covering all major areas of science, social science and humanities. All the staff and student can access this.
- There are some online journals too, that are accessible from the library.
